Vowels and Consonants

Speech—communication by meaningful sounds, or the spoken language.

<u>Writing</u>—language in written form, or speech reduced to a system of symbols that are meaningful to a community using the language.

Sounds used to produce speech are called vowels and consonants.

Vowel is the basic sound in speech made by vibrating the vocal cords.

Consonant is an interruption or a restriction of that sound or passage of breath.

The resulting component parts are called **<u>syllables</u>**—a vowel or a diphthong set apart by a consonant or consonants from preceding or following vowels or diphthongs.

One or more syllables forming a unit that conveys an idea is a word.

We do not speak just words, however, but <u>sentences</u>, which are formed of one or more words to convey a thought.
